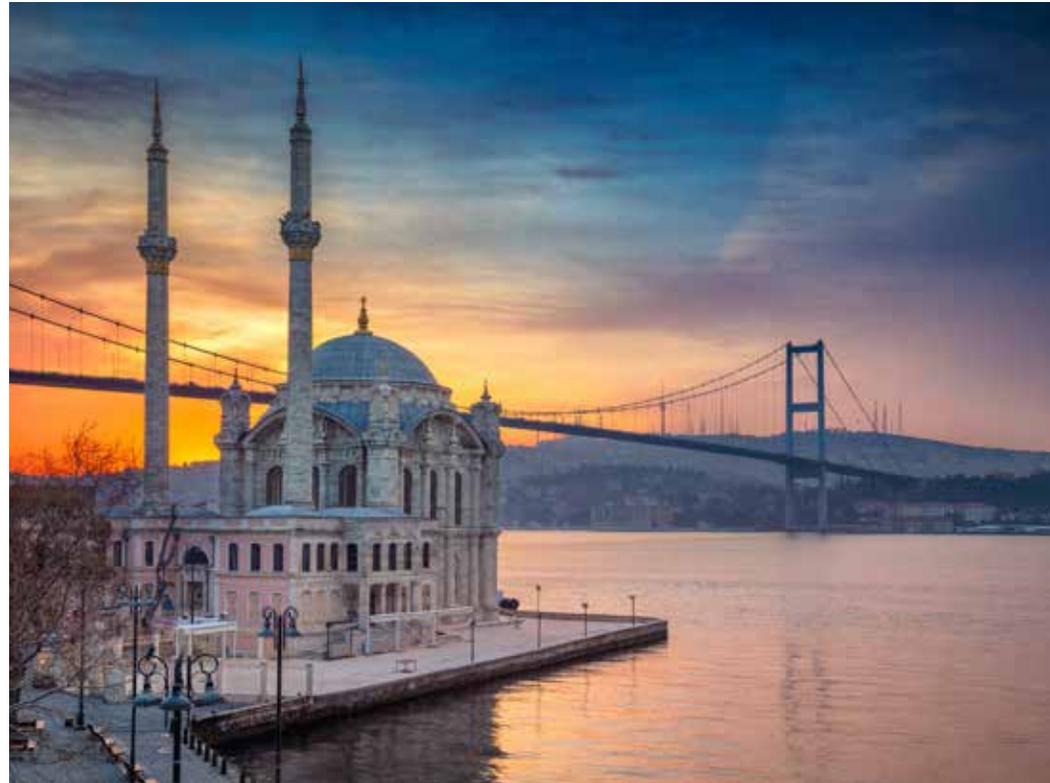
Again, on behalf of your colleagues in the BC, welcome to ICANN81. All best for a productive time in Istanbul.

On June 11, 2024, during ICANN80 in Kigali, the BC held a successful outreach event at Norrsken House thanks for the invaluable support of the Rwanda ICT Chamber and the Africa ICT Alliance (AfICTA).

The three hour event stressed the importance and benefits of involvement in the BC, ICANN and AfICTA with presentations from GNSO counsellor Lawrence Olawale-Roberts; Axiom Consulting's Adetola Sogbesan; ICANN's Director Stakeholder Engagement & Operations for Africa Yaovi Atohoun; AfICTA's Segun

Omolosho; and Robert Ford, President of the Rwanda Software Testing Qualification Board.

Over 60 people responded to the RSVP sent out by the Rwanda ICT Chamber for the event, and final attendance was about 45. Opening remarks were provided by BC Chair Mason Cole and Emceed by Segunfunmi Olajide with several BC members attending including Steve DelBianco, Marie Pattullo, Arinola Akinyemi, Zak Muscovitch, David Snead, Imran Hossen, Nenad Orlik and Tess Diaz. ICANN Outreach Dhaka 2024: Empowering Business Stakeholders in Bangladesh's Digital Future

As part of ICANN's ongoing global engagement, the ICANN Outreach Dhaka 2024 program served as a critical platform to enhance the visibility and participation of Bangladesh's business stakeholders in the global domain name ecosystem. Held at the Bangladesh Telecommunication Regulatory Commission (BTRC) Auditorium on the 11th and 14th of July 2024, the event was co-hosted by ICANN and EyHost Ltd., with the support of the Bangladeshi hosting community and key partners like APTLD and ISOC Bangladesh.

Unlocking Business Growth Through ccTLD and gTLD Expansion

One of the most significant outcomes of this event was the decision by the Honorable State Minister of the Ministry of Posts, Telecommunications, and Information Technology, to direct the ccTLD authority to deploy a fully automated system for .bd and .বাংলা domain registrations. This pivotal change will allow private sector businesses in Bangladesh to become registrars, enabling both local and global registrations for these ccTLDs, akin to gTLDs. For business stakeholders, this shift unlocks tremendous growth potential. Local domain and hosting companies now have the opportunity to retain both the registry fees and business revenue within the country, strengthening their market presence and boosting the national economy. In turn, these businesses are better



positioned to expand globally, bringing in foreign revenue and contributing to Bangladesh's growing influence in the global domain industry.

Business Constituency (BC) Participation: A Key Highlight

The event also saw active participation from Mr. Mason Cole, Chair of ICANN's Business Constituency (BC), who played a pivotal role in engaging with Bangladeshi business leaders. During the roundtable discussions with local business stakeholders and academia, Mr. Cole provided valuable insights into the BC's role within ICANN and how businesses can leverage the DNS for growth. His presentations focused on the importance of engaging with ICANN and the opportunities available to

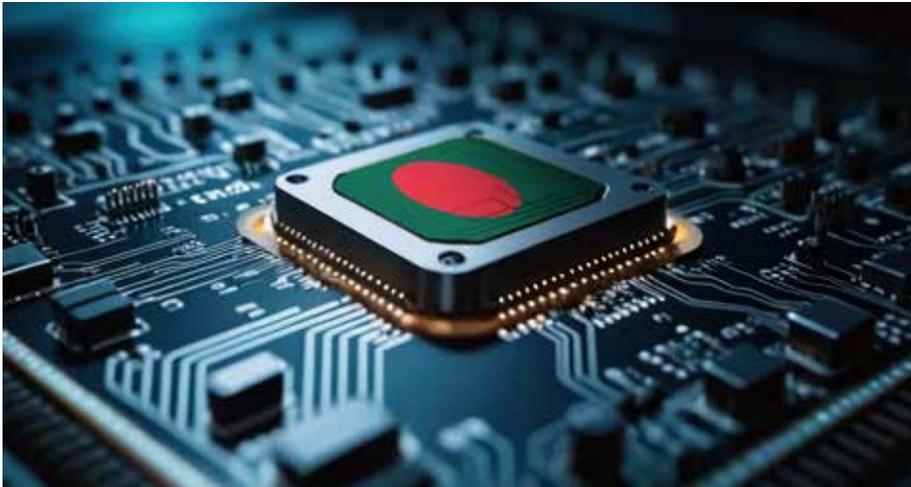
businesses in the digital economy. BC members and local stakeholders had the chance to discuss crucial topics, including the expansion of new gTLDs, Universal Acceptance (UA), and the evolving role of domain businesses in the global marketplace.
