Shaping the Digital Future of African Businesses:

The AfIGF at Africa's Political Capital

Hosted by the Economic Commission for Africa and Ministry of Innovation and Technology of Ethiopia, the 13th African Internet Governance Forum (AfIGF) took place in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia at the United Nations Conference Center (UNCC) from the 20th to the 22nd of November, 2024. The forum which was held under the theme "Building our Multi-Stakeholder Digital Future for Africa", was officially launched on the 21st of November by the opening remarks from his excellency Dr. Belete Molla - Minister of Innovation and Technology of Ethiopia. Dr. Belete Molla noted in his opening remarks that the forum presents a valuable opportunity for learning from one another and forging partnership to accelerate Africa's digital progress. Being the seat of the African Union

Headquarters and many UN offices, Addis Ababa is referred by many as the political center of Africa. This AfIGF event saw the participation of many delegates from Africa, making Addis Ababa an international stage for the IGF once again after the debut of the annual IGF back in December 2022. Cybersecurity, data governance, digital rights, the New gTLD, Universal Acceptance and African Women in Al were among the topics discussed through the sessions held on this AfIGF.

Business Constituency (BC) Participation

Businesses ranging from startups to large technology firms were among the participants. A number of sessions addressed to the business community as agents of change within the Internet

governance ecosystem of Africa. I was honored to represent the BC on the forum, where I introduced the BC's role within ICANN and the business community and encouraged business leaders to join the BC to become key players in the digital and domain name agenda of their regions. The importance of participating in ICANN and the BC was discussed in terms of how African businesses can benefit from the growing domain name marketplace, both as business users and domain name providers. The expansion of new gTLDs, Universal Acceptance and Internationalized Domain Names were mentioned as few potential areas for participation from which African businesses can take immense advantage.

Empowering African Businesses through UA Readiness

The Universal Acceptance session hosted by the UASG team of ICANN was one session that saw active participation from business leaders. It was reported that businesses can drive the UA agenda forward by bridging the gap between policy frameworks and real-world application. As discussed on the session, migrating software and applications towards UA readiness creates an enormous opportunity for software businesses. It was assessed that UA readiness by itself is a \$9.8+ billion opportunity for businesses to take advantage, and African businesses should tap into this huge market while helping maintain the safety and stability of the Internet. continued over page >>



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The New gTLD Applicant Support Program

Another session that saw active participation from business leaders was the new gTLD Applicant Support Program (ASP) hosted by the ICANN African stakeholder engagement team. According to the presentation of the stakeholder engagement team, there is immense opportunity for small and large businesses to partner with a government agency to apply for the ASP. As discussed on this session, applicants can enjoy not only financial assistance such as reduced application and evaluation fees, but also access to pro bono legal and consultancy services.

Meeting the demands of Multilingual Internet

The Ethiopic/Ge'ez script is used as a writing system for more than 20 languages spoken in Ethiopia and the neighboring country, Eritrea. It is believed to be used by more than 65 million people worldwide. Due to the support from ICANN through the IDN Program, the Ethiopic script has been integrated in to the Root Zone

Label Generation Rules (RZ-LGR) since 2016. So far, efforts to register an IDN ccTLD in the Ethiopic script have not yield any result. Likewise, there currently are no IDN gTLD domain names in the Ethiopic IDNs at the top and the second level. This AfIGF saw a discussion on policy and implementation milestones that would allow the Ethiopic script IDNs to be registered and used by the script user community. While this has been on the top of the agendas of the ICANN African Stakeholder Engagement team, it was put forward that the issue ultimately requires a concerted effort between ICANN, national policy makers and the script user community.
